Description This course is designed to introduce and acclimate students to film as a significant

artistic, rhetorical and cultural medium. Course content focuses on film as an element of popular culture, as well as film genres, cinematic techniques and cinematic conventions. Explain the term "mise-en-scene" and how it works in a film.

Analyze the role of "mise-en-scene" in a film.

6. Discuss the different elements of cinematography and demonstrate understanding of how they affect specific shots and scenes in films.

Learning Objectives

Analyze elements of cinematography.

Connect elements of cinematography to a film's greater meaning.

7. Explain the major elements of "continuity editing."

Learning Objectives

Define continuity editing.

Use continuity editing in a project.

8. Examine the major elements of sound in film, including how sound interacts with the film image.

Learning Objectives

Define the elements of cinematic sound and their history.

Connect certain elements of sound within film as a whole.

9. Discuss film in American culture and the movie industry's role.

Learning Objectives

Demonstrate an understanding of film as a business industry.

Identify the impact of film as industry, on film as art.

10. Explain film in its cultural and historic context.

Learning Objectives

Analyze and identify the cultural and historic context of a cinematic work.

Analyze the impact of cultural and historic context on a work of film.

11. Realize the use of film in personal expression.

Learning Objectives

Utilize film in personal expression.

Define film's role in personal expression.

12. Apply what you have learned to critically evaluate a film.

Learning Objectives

Identify the strengths and weaknesses of a film's structure.

Critically evaluate a film in oral presentation.
