Course Information

Description This course introduces students to works of literature and film from a variety of

world cultures. The course is designed to increase knowledge of world cultures and appreciation and understanding of cultural differences in representation and in seeing, believing, and being. The course emphasizes critical thinking, reading and writing. (Prerequisites: Must have a score of 78 or higher on the reading portion of the Accuplacer test or completion of READ 90 with a grade of C or higher.) (MNTC

Explain how audience response influences interpretation of a piece.

3. Practice the role of literary critic.

Learning Objectives

Develop an awareness of aesthetic and practical criteria for evaluating literature.

Distinguish between descriptive and prescriptive criticism.

Describe political, economic, and cultural elements that influence literature.

4. Use the language of literary structure and form.

Learning Objectives

Understand terms such as "rising action," "stanza," "setting," or other literary/film vocabulary.

Practice interpreting literature using literary and film terms and vocabulary.

Relate cultural, social, religious, and linguistic differences to elements of literature.

5. Analyze specific international problems, illustrating the cultural, economic, and political differences which will affect their solution(s) as they appear in literature.

Learning Objectives

Study the history surrounding a particular piece of literature.

Compare the historical forces of other times to our current time frame.

6. Write about literature.

Learning Objectives

Use the language of literary criticism to respond to books in writing.

Apply critical thinking skills to writing about literature.

Complete short papers and written assignments.

7. Formulate personal reactions to literature.

Learning Objectives

Use the language of literary criticism to discuss pieces with an informed, personal perspective.

Compare alternate views of one piece of literature.

8. Demonstrate knowledge of cultural, social, religious, and linguistic differences across the world.

Learning Objectives

Examine literature from various cultures.

Discuss cultural influence on literature.

Compare literature across cultures.

9. Analyze films with a specific focus on human diversity issues around the world.

Learning Objectives

View films from diverse populations.

Discuss cultural influences on films.

Review how international problems (including cultural, economic, and political differences) influence a film's message.

10. Explore films within their specific cultural and historical context.

Learning Objectives

Study the historical context of a film.

Study the cultural context of a film.

11. Write about films.

Learning Objectives

Use the language of film criticism to discuss/respond in writing to films.

Apply critical thinking to interpret and respond in writing to films.

12. Identify universal human values within world literature.

Learning Objectives

Identify universal human values and themes in literature and film.

Articulate and respond to the expression of universal values in various pieces of literature and film.

Discuss the responsibility of a world citizen as it relates to studying literature and film.
