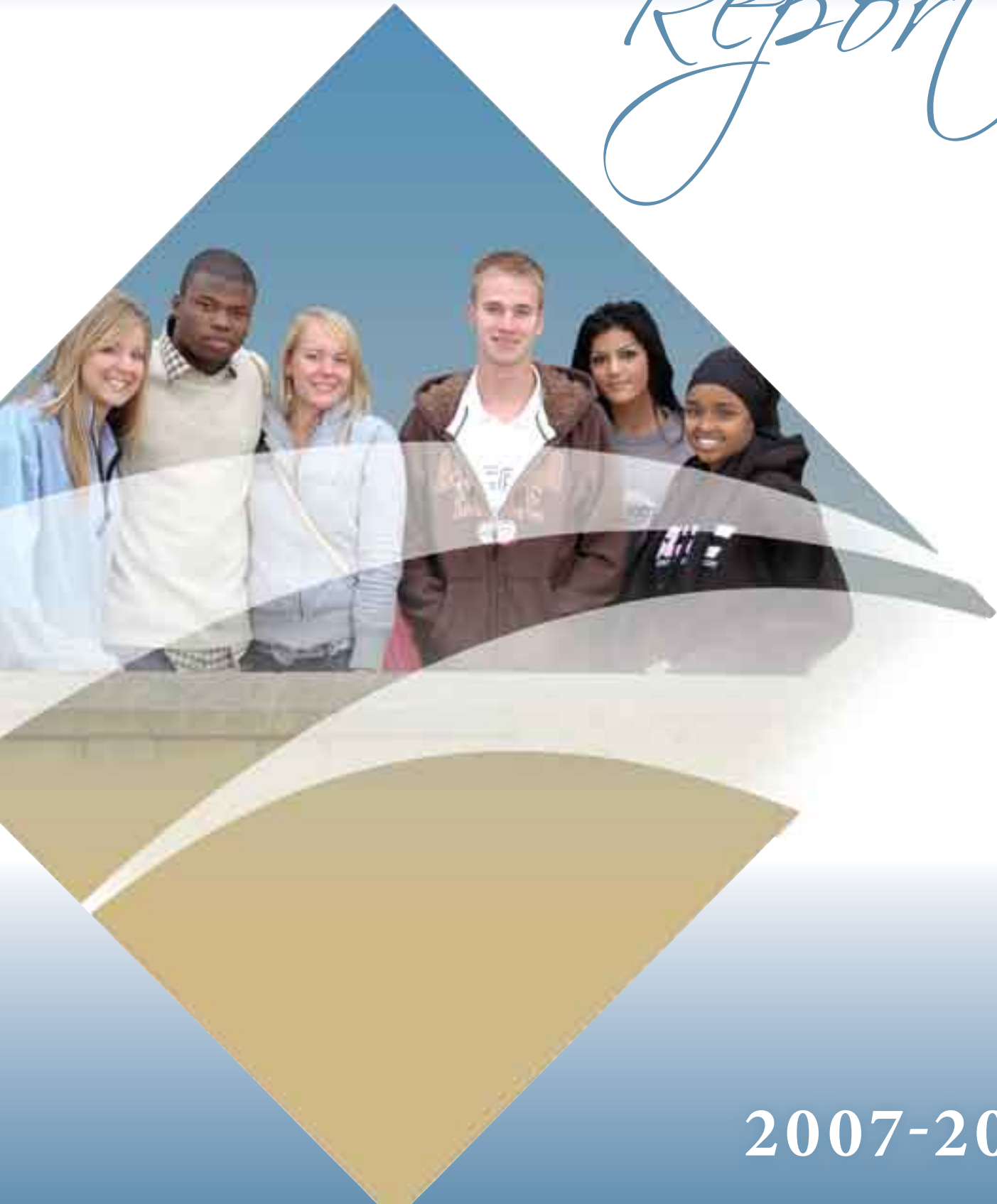

I am pleased to report that great strides have been made during the past year at South Central College through collaboration efforts with our stakeholders – business and industry, community leaders, educational partners and our students.

Together we have provided increased access and opportunities for students through record numbers of student scholarships provided by our Foundations, including the award of four full-tuition Presidential Scholarships; created a new Mechatronics program, based on the needs of the manufacturing industry and their generous financial support; completed the remodeling of the lower level on our Faribault Campus and planning the remodeling and expansion of the campus to meet the future educational needs around the I-35 corridor.

South Central College has asked for your input. We have listened to our students and advisory committees, and have invited many of you to participate in workforce forums to help set the direction for continuous improvement to ensure high-quality learning programs and services for our students. In addition, South Central College has begun the self-study process for continued accreditation through the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association. This ongoing process of improvement will culminate with a site visit to our college in February of 2010.

As you read through our report, I am certain you will see that SCC is continuing to grow, that we are good stewards of our resources and remain a vital player in the economic development of the south central region of Minnesota.

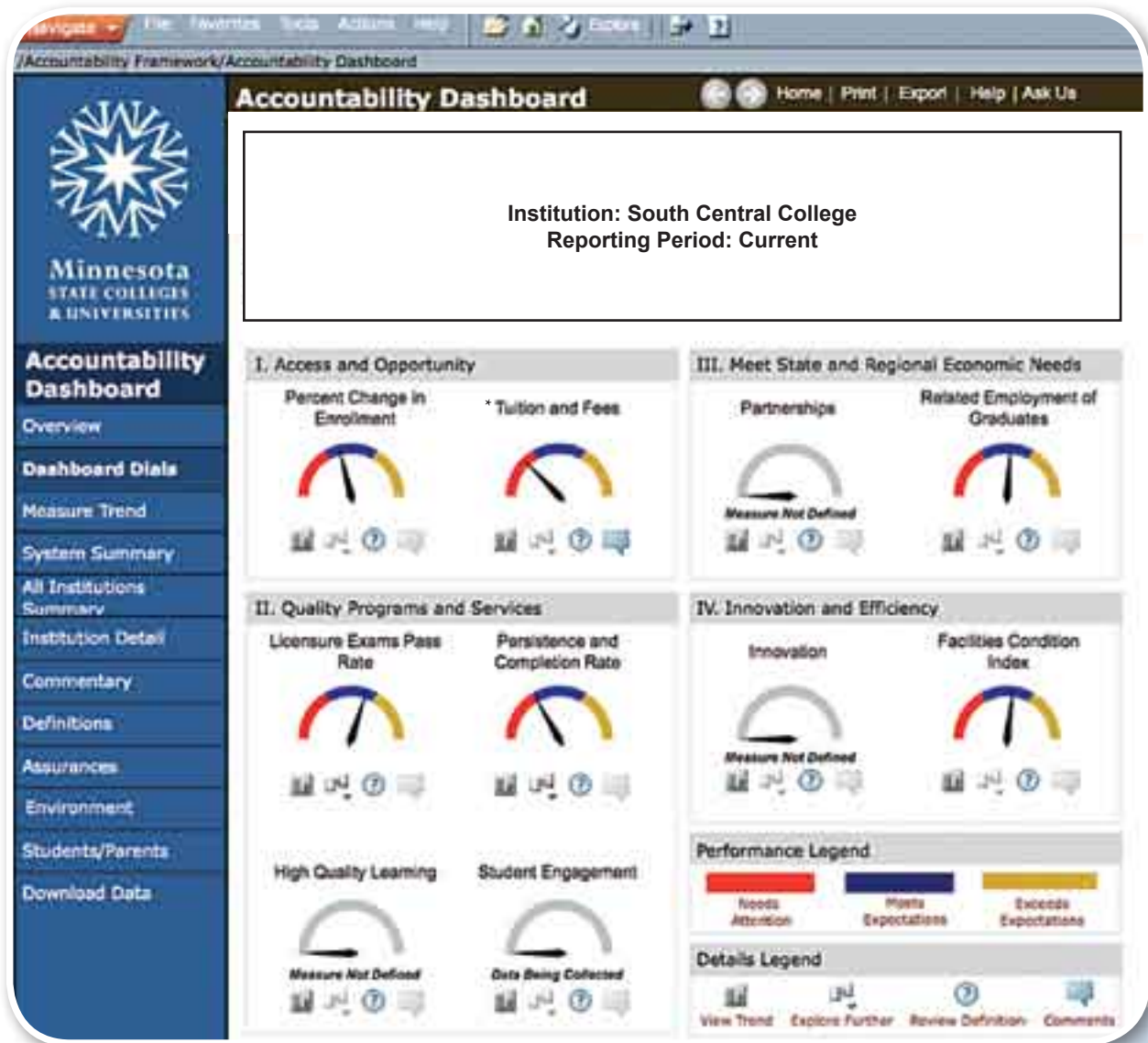

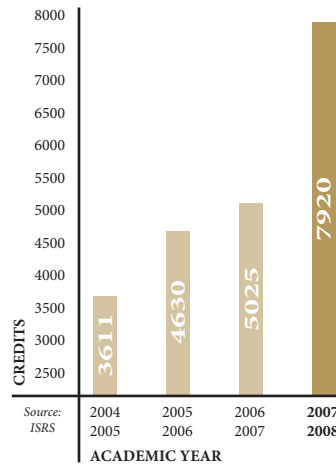

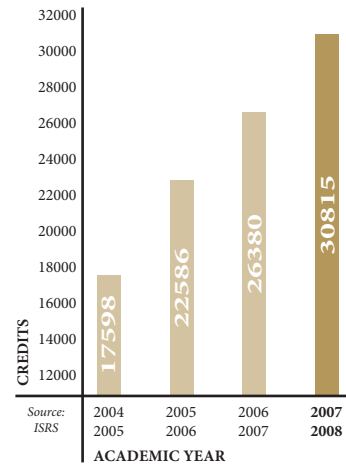

Liberal Arts & Sciences Growth



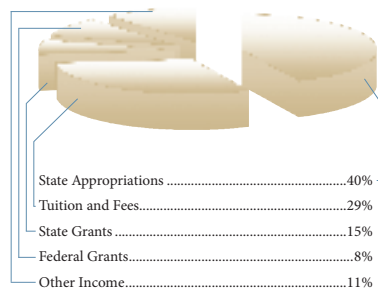

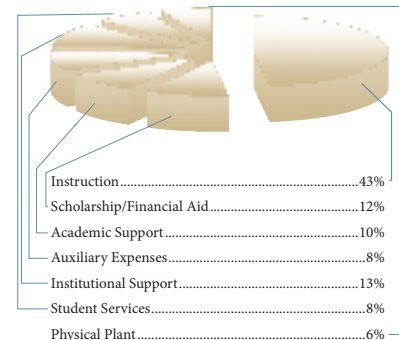

GOALS

Accomplishments

GOAL 1: SUPPORT STUDENT SUCCESS

- SCC participated in the Higher Learning Commission Assessment Academy and the college has implemented a train-the-trainer system for an Assessment Mentoring Team. The first round of mentors was trained in July and began work with their assigned programs/divisions during fall in-service.
- The Liberal Arts and Sciences Division (LAS) engaged in a pilot project to create electronic portfolios for students in order to use them as part of the LAS assessment process. The portfolio platform used is MnSCU's Efolio, and MnSCU provided a grant of \$12,500 to initiate the project.
- SCC's online enrollment increased by 58 percent to 264.25 FyEs this academic year.
- SCC conducted a full implementation of its online student orientation format.
- SCC is in the process of hiring a grant & technical writer to assist the college in responding to future grant opportunities and meet the college's targets for "institutional support from public sources."
- SCC has raised funds to hire faculty for developing the Mechatronics program and is making several equipment purchases. This was accomplished in collaboration with the North Mankato Foundation and several industry partners. The program is scheduled to begin in fall 2009.
- SCC has successfully replaced 4 members and added a Dean of Economic Development to its 12 member administrative team. Additionally, the college has added Multicultural, Admissions and Instructional Technology/Digital Media Directors to lead initiatives for the college.
- SCC received bonding funds for design work (up through the development of construction documents) for the Faribault campus. The North Mankato campus pre-design will be resubmitted for consideration in 2010.
- SCC, with the support of the Retention Committee, the college's academic advisors and counseling personnel, has initiated the Academic In Motion (AIM) program to assist and retain students with academic challenges.
- SCC's Retention Committee hosted its 2nd annual Student Success Day event on both campuses.
- The Child Development Careers program has established an articulation agreement with Minnesota State University, Mankato. 60 credits of the A.S. in Child Development Careers degree will now transfer toward a B.S. degree in Early Childhood Education at MSU,M.
- A service learning contingent of SCC nursing students traveled to Guatemala in May.
- SCC's first student group obtained credits for international travel during coursework held in Italy in May.
- SCC added a new physics lab to the North Mankato campus.

GOAL 2: ENHANCE STUDENT ACCESS

- Enrollments increased at SCC by seven percent in fiscal year 2008. This increase follows previous gains of five percent (fiscal year 2007) and five percent (fiscal year 2006).
- Our newly appointed Multicultural Director began work at the end of May. The college has reallocated space on the North Mankato campus for a Multicultural Center and is in the middle of renovating the space.
- The SCC foundations recently awarded \$283,350 in scholarships to 422 students.
- The Vice President of Finance and Operations held numerous informational meetings for administration and faculty leaders concerning the influences impacting the Instructional Cost Study.
- SCC began offering concurrent enrollment courses in Basic Nursing with students in both Mankato High Schools and the South Central Service Cooperative as part of SCC's High Step partnership with Mankato Area Schools and the Thro Corporation, and as a first step in the nursing pathway.
- SCC offered its first concurrent liberal arts and sciences course in the Faribault High School fall of '07.
- The Marketing & Recruitment Committee is currently selecting an external consultant to identify strategies and marketing messages for select target markets, including non-traditional adult populations and under-represented students. Additionally, the committee distributed over \$20,000 to program specific marketing projects.
- The College Prep Partnership between North Hennepin, SCC and the Mankato Area Public Schools received an Outstanding Adult Education Program Award at the Minnesota Association for Continuing Adult Education in November. Accomplishments include: Sixty-five individuals served through College Prep; 2-5 referrals each week; fifteen of those students enrolled in college and thirteen of the participants enrolled at SCC.
- SCC partnered with the Faribault Area Chamber of Commerce to host a Career Fair for 300 juniors enrolled at Faribault High School and the Discovery Charter School.
- SCC hosted the regional STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Summit in February for 9th and 10th graders from fourteen area high schools.
- SCC approved eighteen faculty Awards of Excellence totaling \$77,700. Project examples included the development of online assessment orientation/training and common course development.
- Liberal Arts and Sciences credits at SCC increased by 12 percent during the past fiscal year.

& Achievements

GOAL 3: NURTURE RELATIONSHIPS

- SCC, in partnership with Greater Mankato Area Growth, co-hosted summits on health care and manufacturing to identify workforce development needs and priorities for the region. Similar discussions will be taking place in the Faribault & Owatonna area.
- A partnership between SCC, New Ulm Medical Center, Sleepy Eye Medical Center, Madelia Community Hospital and the New Ulm Oak Hills Living Center received a \$270,000 Minnesota Job Skills Partnership grant for the delivery of nursing education modules related to nursing assessment and leadership.
- SCC admitted its first class into the Civil Engineering Technology program this academic year and will be admitting students to the new Construction Field Supervision program in fall 2008.
- SCC's Mankato Campus Foundation raised \$145,000 from nine contributors to support the hiring of a Mechatronics instructor. The Mechatronics major is scheduled to begin in Fall 2009.
- Accounting faculty, Doug Yentsch and Harold Chromy, received the Minnesota Valley Action Council's Nicollet County Community Action Supporter Award for a service learning project they engaged their students in, assisting with tax preparations.
- SCC hosted the first Global Connections in Southern Minnesota Conference in September of 2007. Keynote speakers included: Abdi Samatar, Fan Shen and Congressman Tim Walz. A concert by Brule, ethnic meals prepared by SCC culinary students and staff and a wide range of breakout sessions were included in the two-day event for college, high school students and community leaders.
- SCC is a partner in the Owatonna College and University Center (OCUC) and will deliver higher education to the Owatonna area residents on the OCUC campus.
- SCC is collaborating with other area colleges to establish a new Collegiate Leadership Academy to encourage leadership in our area communities.
- SCC hosted a delegation of officials from the Ministry of Education in Thailand, including the Secretary General of the eight-hundred and five vocational colleges of that country. As part of their visit, SCC arranged for the group to visit the Office of the Chancellor and several other MnSCU campuses.
- SCC was recognized for service to the Greater Mankato Diversity Council.

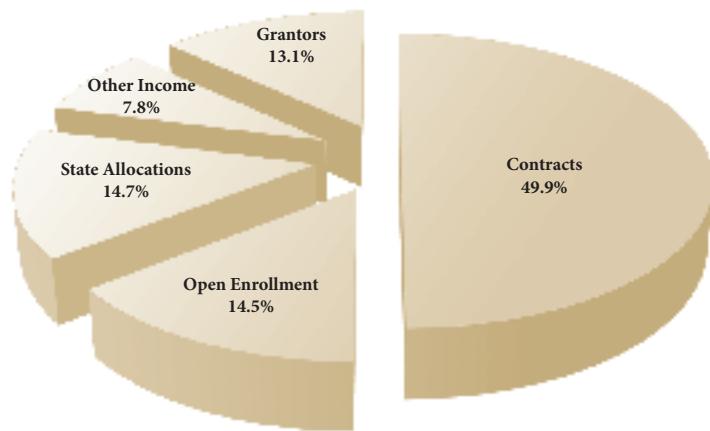
